Providing Relief from Natural Disasters, Food for the Hungry, and Support for the Poor and Oppressed.



Around the world, millions of people lack access to sustainable food sources, clean water, sanitation, education, and opportunity. The three programs supported by One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) — Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People — all work in different ways to serve individuals and

communities in need. From initial disaster response to ongoing community development, their work fits together to provide people with safety, sustenance, and hope. During the season of Lent (March 5 – April 20), we will learn how our gifts to OGHS help improve the lives of people in these challenging situations. The Offering provides us a way to share God's love with our neighbors in need. In fact, OGHS is the single, largest way Presbyterian come together every year to work for a better world.

PRESBYTERIAN DISASTER ASSISTANCE (PDA)

Works alongside communities as they recover and find hope after the devastation of natural or human-caused disasters, and support for refugees. PDA receives 32% of funds.

PRESBYTERIAN HUNGER PROGRAM (PHP)

Takes action to alleviate hunger, care for creation, and the systemic causes of poverty so all may be fed. PHP receives 36% of funds.

SELF-DEVELOPMENT OF PEOPLE (SDOP) Invests in communities responding to their experiences of oppression, poverty and injustice and educates Presbyterians about the impact of these issues. SDOP receives 32% of funds.

One Great Hour of Sharing also promotes environmental stewardship. "Make a Difference this Lent" is a resource and guide to the practice of environmental stewardship. The guides and fish banks will be distributed to the Sunday School, or you may pick them up from the display in Fellowship Hall.

BACH IN THE SUBWAYS CONCERT Come Celebrate the 340th birthday of JS Bach

Sunday, March 23, 3pm in our Sanctuary

On Sunday, March 23, 3 PM, the First Presbyterian Church of Succasunna will once again host a concert called "Bach in the Subways", presented by various local musicians. This event was well-attended last year; all the musicians commented on what a pleasure it was to play in such a wonderful space with an appreciative audience. This year's participants include Anthony Celentano, organist and Bach

specialist (Anthony served here at FPCS for several years as organist/choir director); Rabbi Inna Serebro-Litvak, a talented soprano; Clarinets ala Mode (clarinetists Carlyn Smith, John Centenaro, Vincent Rufino & Joe Elliott); Oboist Karen Cavaliere; Cellist Jane Rufino; pianist June Kibe and perhaps some additional musicians.

Why "Bach in the Subway"?

In 2010, cellist Dale Henderson began performing the Bach Cello Suites in the subways of New York City, believing that many people never get a chance to experience classical music live and up close. Henderson declined donations and his efforts received appreciative attention from the media, fans and other musicians. In celebration of Bach's 326th birthday on March 21, 2011, Henderson invited other musicians to join him, and in following years, this gained momentum throughout the world. In 2015, for Bach's 330th birthday, thousands of musicians performed in 150 cities and 40 countries in subway stations, train stations, cafes, malls, etc., in concerts which were open free of charge to all. Since then, it has extended over multiple days, and now musicians around the world unite to connect multitudes with this incredible music.

We hope you will come and join us for a free, fun and educational experience on this celebration of the 340th birthday of Bach, followed by fellowship time.

It may be hard to believe that in a month from the time this is written, it will be the season of spring! At the moment, we are in mid February, with temperatures around 20 degrees and the past 2 Sundays, worship attendance has taken a hit due to snow and ice that fell over weekends. Hopefully, you are reading this on a sunny day, with thoughts of increasing warmth, the purple of Lent, and the bright pastels of Easter on your mind (not to mention a new baseball season).

Lent is a time of reflection...and time to seek the presence and counsel of Jesus in some new way, challenging us to identify those aspects of our lives that can benefit from change. If sunrise is too early for you, fear not; our **Easter** service in the church will be at 11am.

You may associate Lent with the spiritual and practical discipline or "giving something up," which can be an enlightening experience. In an amazing paradox, we may discover that giving up something in Lent "fills" us: Lent may be a time of receiving, as well!

Lent and Received. Receiving new ways of perceiving. Receiving new ways of responding to God's love in Christ. Maybe that means being at worship more often, or stepping into a new role at church, or checking out Monday morning Bible study, or finding out first hand what **Messy Church** is like on March 9^{th} at 5pm (and April 6^{th} at 1pm with communion) as we consider what it means to "Grow in Faith." Maybe it means appreciating the amazing sounds of the **Bach Concert** March 23^{rd} at 3pm.
